How do we tell the story of literature developing in multi-and transcultural areas? What is the literary and cultural specificity of places such as Bukovina, formerly Galicia-Bukovina, a crossroads between Romania, Ukraine, Hungary, Poland, once the extreme edge of the Austro-Hungarian Empire in which Romanian, German, Ukrainian, Jiddisch, Polish, Hungarian, Rom voices resounded? - memories of a Russian and Tatar East, or of Bessarabia, Transylvania, the disputed Carpathians, exchanges and contiguities with the Ottoman and Balkan worlds, and much more. Places interspersed with multiple languages, cultures, traditions are today theatres of war, for the Ukrainian side, in which the town of Czernowitz is located. How to map, to narrate in a relational sense the extraordinary cultural liveliness, the mutual contacts between the great writers born in this important area of Eastern Europe, belonging to different cultures and languages? What are the challenges for a transcultural and plural literary historiography?
